



Spirituality Encountering The Divine

"Lord, teach us to pray." (Luke 11:1) Perhaps our most direct method of communication to God, prayer is the arrow we shoot from our bow filled with urgent needs and hesitant hopes. Let's not forget about the beauty of the earth. God's handiwork is evident in the delicacy of a spider web as well as in the spray from a mighty waterfall. We'll explore outdoors to inspire our prayer lives.

There is no "one size fits all" approach to one's relationship with God. There is no formula that fits everyone. Some individuals thrive when gathered as a community of believers for worship. Others take a solo approach. Why should our prayer lives be any different?

I hope you can participate in this month's activities as we explore ways to connect with God that fit your individual needs. Maybe, then, we can listen to our Creator's voice as we learn all the many ways God's voice speaks to our soul.
